





RAISING STANDARDS OF EQUITY

... To become a race-conscious community, we have to be intentional about equitable inclusion and examine the ways residents experience multiple forms of discrimination. As we identify and understand barriers to inclusion, and who the most marginalized are, we will build a community for all to belong.

Fineview Citizens and Perry Hilltop Citizens' Councils recognize the Racial divide that exists in today's climate. We are saddened because Racism is alive and as profound as it was in the 60s and throughout American history. This is largely through systemic racism, meaning this country was built on racist policies and laws. We don't subscribe to the one bad apple theory, which points at an individual as the problem, or the cause behind racism. We have been watching our Neighborhoods (Fineview and Perry Hilltop) transform around us. Neighborhoods that once were diverse have aggressively been moving toward upscale white communities, while the displacement of Black and poor families occurs at a rapid rate. Other Northside communities have experienced gentrification at an alarming pace; this phenomenon continues to threaten our community.

Fineview Citizens and Perry Hilltop Citizens' Councils are committed to building internal capacity for further understanding the impact of racism on Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) communities, interrogating our own structures and systems, and improving how we address racial equity within the organization.

Fineview Citizens and Perry Hilltop Citizens' Councils worked with the University of Pittsburgh School of Social Work through Pathways to Community Safety, Healing and Wellness, an 8 week series addressing community violence and mental health. Sessions included areas of indirect / direct intervention; building trust among neighbors; restorative and respectful strategies; effective listening and communication skills; and a community project to build healthy relationships. The basketball court at PV / Fowler Park was restored and a game between youth, police and adults was arranged.

Our Pathways to Community Safety, Healing and Wellness project trained youth and adults to build strong relationships with neighbors as ways to feel supported and to confront behaviors that violate neighborhood norms and values.

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

LEARN & EARN PROGRAM

RHONDA STROZIER COORDINATOR LEARN & EARN PROGRAM

Guided by the youth working group Chairs - Dwayne Barker, Giannie Haley Braafhart and staff, Rhonda Strozier -Fineview Citizens and Perry Hilltop Citizens' Councils hired two youth coordinators to lead the Learn and Earn Program in 2022. 8 youth were employed from June through August.

- There were 18 guest speakers that engaged the youth in interactive lunch and learn series which included a focus on leadership, career planning, mental health and well-being.
- Over the six week program, youth learned landscaping skills, including the use of small equipment, and worked in the community on new housing developments such as Sandstone Quarry.
- Youth collected litter throughout Fowler Park and the surrounding neighborhood.
- Youth attended a field trip to Phipps Conservatory
- Youth volunteered at Light of Life Food Pantry, located at The Pittsburgh Project, to disburse healthy food donations to residents.

Seniors have fun creating and competing for great prizes donated by partners.

The organizations received grants to provide Senior Serenades in 2021 and 2022. The program coordinated by Greg Manley and Carla Arnold made such a nice impression in 2021 that they asked us to do it again in 2022. We did a serenade with Light of Life, Steelworkers Tower and the Reformed Presbyterian Home -The Upper Room.

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In 2023, Fineview Citizens and Perry Hilltop Citizens' Councils will curate two more senior serenades. Funding for this program provides musical performances and social opportunities for our seniors with limited access to outside programming. It is a highlight among our senior living facilities.




HOUSING + EQUITY



AFFORDABLE HOUSING

According to the Five-Year Affordable Housing Plan, **there are ~ 692 affordable housing units** in Fineview and Perry Hilltop. According to the US Census American Community Survey, there is a total of 2,326 occupied housing units in this area. By these counts, 29% of all occupied housing units provide a form of subsidized affordable housing.

According to the Five-Year Affordable Housing Plan, there are a total of 2,326 occupied housing units in our neighborhoods. Of these occupied units,1,125 residents are cost burdened. If there are 692 affordable units in Fineview and Perry Hilltop, then there is a lack of 423 affordable units.








OUTREACH Resources & volunteers


Neighbors who moved into Fineview or Perry Hilltop received a Welcome Kit. Each kit offers info about the neighborhood, resource packets and membership forms.

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FUNDRAISER - FINEVIEW STEP CHALLENGE



Pittsburgh is home to the largest number of public steps in the country, and we love all 800 of them. Our ancestors built these staircases during Pittsburgh's industrial era, using them to navigate the hilly terrain to commute to work. Residents still use public steps to commute, but use of the stairs has evolved to include recreation; as connectors between walking trails; and for training outside of the gym.

Fineview has established an identity around its staircases, and we are proud to sponsor such a unique Pittsburgh event. The Fineview Step Challenge is held on the second Saturday in October. The step challenge was established in 1995. The fundraiser supports FCC's goals to preserve steps, hillside remediation, beautification and event programming.

FINEVIEW COMMUNITY GARDEN

The community garden is an edible, pollinator garden accessible to all neighbors. Residents have an opportunity to participate in the garden with limited knowledge of gardening or with a lot of experience. FCC offers community plots which everyone can plant and harvest together or work individual plots. The community gardening tasks are split up and watering and weeding is a social, mindful activity for all ages.







Bio-diversity, native plants and pollinators, are important to the health of our communities. Pollinators contribute to our edible gardens, flora and fauna health. We aim to educate neighbors about producing their own food and providing healthy choices.

UNITY CORNER GARDEN CLUB

This garden marks the first collaborative community project between Fineview and Perry Hilltop Citizens councils. The mural was designed and created by residents along with artists Linda Wallen and Sandy Kessler Kaminski. Youth and elders engaged about what is important to them. Today the garden is stewarded by Master Gardener, Tricia Patsilevas and coordinated by Community Outreach & Engagement Director, Carla Arnold. Volunteers make this a successful, vibrant garden.

GREEN SPACE + REAUTIFICATION LITTER BRIGADE / LITTER LEAGUE

Volunteers meet weekly to combat litter and dumping in our neighborhoods March - November. Litter walks bring people together to improve neighbor relations. April - June, they compete in a Litter League coordinated by Allegheny Cleanways and Friends of the Riverfront which tackles large dumpsites and heavy lifting across Allegheny County.
